



Ski survival: How to return from the piste in one piece

Planning a weekend on the slopes? Before packing the salopettes and ski gloves, it's worth remembering that skiing is responsible for an (1) **(ALARM)** number of injuries. As Britons escape the office and head to the mountains, many of them leave their common sense at home - and return with some very nasty souvenirs.

"Skiing is a strange sport which requires no intrinsic (2) **(STRONG)** or skill - anyone with a credit card can walk into a ski hire shop and hire the kit," says Steve Bollen, president of the British Orthopaedic Sports Trauma Association and an orthopaedic surgeon at Bradford Royal Infirmary. "Then they set off down the hill, and if anything goes wrong they may not have the strength or fitness to do anything about it." (3) **(TIRE)**, lack of fitness and a desire to fit in as much time on the slopes as possible - plus the rise in (4) **(POPULAR)** of weekend ski trips - are all reasons why Bollen says he is seeing more knee (5) **(INJURE)** than ever before.

"Skiing is designed to rupture knee ligaments," he says. "Your lower leg is fixed in a rigid boot which is then attached to a 6ft lever arm. It doesn't take much (6) **(IMAGINE)** to realise what forces are applied to the knee if the ski is twisted and the bindings don't release - the result is an audible snap, immediate swelling and another victim tobogganed off the slopes."

Damage to ligaments - the connective tissue that holds the knee together - is painful, can require surgery and can damage joints permanently if left (7) **(TREAT)**. After studying more than 200 patients with anterior cruciate or medial ligament injuries in his clinic, Bollen says that the number of those injuries caused by skiing has increased from 9 per cent in 1996 to 28 per cent in 2004. "I have seen three ruptured anterior cruciates from skiing this week."

According to research carried out by the Ski Club of Great Britain, the vast (8) **(MAJOR)** of skiing trips are for seven days or less, and 28 per cent of (9) **(SKI)** describe themselves as "beginners". And with more than 1.3 million Britons taking to the slopes on skis and snowboards last year, it seems likely that the problem will worsen. Even (10) **(EXPERIENCE)** skiers need to be wary of what Bollen calls "half-term syndrome": people who aren't as physically fit as they could be going skiing without prior preparation and spending too long on the slopes without a break.

GHANA DRUG GIRLS LEARN THEIR FATE

Two British girls have been jailed for a year after trying to smuggle cocaine from Ghana to the UK. The two teenagers, Yetunde Diya and Yasemin Vatansever have been getting used to the journey from the Ghana Narcotics Board offices, where they have been locked up since July 2007, to the court in central Accra. They have done it almost every fortnight since their arrest. Once again they were driven in the Narcotics Board's large grey four-wheel drive vehicle with tinted windows. With green patterned African cloth covering their heads, the 16-year-olds were rushed into the courtroom as several local and international media houses struggled to record their fleeting arrival.



One hour later the two students from north London learned their fate. The judge handed down a one-year sentence to each of the girls but under Ghanaian law, with good behaviour, they will serve nine months. We could not get any reaction from the girls as they were whisked away, their heads again covered. But there must have been some relief. Having been caught last July at Accra's airport with 6kg of cocaine in two laptop bags, they could have been given the maximum three-year sentence, which would have seen them locked up in a juvenile detention facility until mid-2010. But after this decision they are now due to be freed on 18 April this year. There were no relatives at the court. Since their adventure in Ghana went so badly wrong, the two girls have received some support from the British High Commission - initially being sent pizzas.

Learning of the verdict, the head of Fair Trials International, Catherine Wolthuizen, said she was pleased the court had followed the recommendation of social workers in setting a relatively short sentence. However, she expressed regret that the bigger fish in this drug smuggling operation had got away with it.

"Given the particular vulnerability of the girls, their lack of any previous criminal record, their youth and their status as pawns in a larger operation, run by other parties who have not yet been caught or prosecuted, it is deeply unfortunate that they, and not the men who lured them to Ghana, are bearing the consequences," she said.

Fair Trials International has been in contact with the girls' relatives in London, who are understood to be relieved at the length of sentence and the fact that their period of uncertainty is now over. Meanwhile, the British government has focused on the warning this trial sends out to other would-be traffickers. "Cases such as these should be a warning to anyone that drugs destroy lives. Whether you are a user or a trafficker you are gambling with your life if you meddle in the drug trade," cautioned Tony Walker of HM Revenue & Customs.

There is no agreement for an exchange of prisoners between the two countries, so Yetunde and Yasemin will now be moved to the juvenile detention facility in Mamobi, a lively suburb of Accra. There they will not be able to avoid the hysteria of the ongoing Africa Cup Of Nations football tournament. Their new inmates will no doubt be cheering on Ghana's Black Stars whose best known player, Michael Essien, has joined in the war on drug smuggling.

"I would like to warn young people not to be fooled by the drug gangs who pretend to offer easy cash for smuggling their poison," said Essien. But, despite the high risk, stopping the trafficking is an uphill struggle because the profits are so great. In Ghana some people look at the cocaine trade as just another way of earning a living.

Obituary: Heath Ledger

Actor Heath Ledger, who has been found dead at the age of 28, was regarded as one of Hollywood's brightest young stars, with a string of acclaimed films behind him and a major career ahead.

The death of such an admired star at such a young age will cause huge shock among fans, the media and the movie industry. He shot onto the A list less ___1___ three years ago with a lead role in the universally acclaimed Brokeback Mountain, which proved he could shine in emotionally challenging roles as ___2___ as comedies and action films.



He played the inarticulate ranch hand Ennis, ___3___ became romantically involved with a rodeo cowboy, played ___4___ Jake Gyllenhaal. It earned him Oscar, Golden Globe and Bafta nominations. After Brokeback Mountain,


Ledger was beginning to win blockbuster roles, and ___5___ just finished playing The Joker in the new Batman film The Dark Knight. A recent trailer showed him playing the character as a sinister villain who proves a match for the superhero, played by Christian Bale. "When we came to shoot the movie it was a physically and mentally draining role ___6___ I thoroughly enjoyed it and this is the most fun I've had with any character," he said.

Ledger was also thought to be in the middle of filming The Imaginarium of Doctor Parnassus, a new fantasy movie with former Monty Python member Terry Gilliam. He has also just been seen in I'm Not There, which saw six actors play characters based ___7___ Bob Dylan at different stages of his career. Ledger's other roles have included a heroin addict in Candy in 2006 ___8___ the title part in 2003's Ned Kelly. He appeared alongside Halle Berry in the Oscar-winning Monster's Ball in 2001, starred in popcorn movie A Knight's Tale the same year, and was seen alongside Mel Gibson in The Patriot in 2000.

___9___ Hollywood debut came in teen comedy 10 Things I Hate About You where he ___10___ in light-hearted Australian gangster movie Two Hands in 1999. And like many Australian actors, he had cut his teeth in TV soaps, playing surfer Scott Irwin in Home and Away in 1997.

Ledger was not known ___11___ a hellraiser, but was said to have been uncomfortable with fame. And the spotlight inevitably fell on him during the ___12___ times as well as the good. He was recently reported to have split from his fiancée Michelle Williams, whom he met when she played his wife in Brokeback Mountain. They had a daughter, Matilda Rose, in October 2005, but ___13___ believed to have parted in late 2007.

Ledger was previously in a relationship with another ___14___, Naomi Watts. Their relationship ended in 2004. But he will be remembered for his film roles and after establishing ___15___ as one of Hollywood's finest actors under 30, Ledger's life has ended just as his talent was beginning to be fulfilled.
