With snow-capped Mt Kilimanjaro, the wildlife-packed Ngorongoro Crater and the vast plains of the Serengeti, northern Tanzania embodies what is for many quintessential Africa. While the main ____ (1)____ (**ATTRACT**) are trekking to the top of Africa and wildlife watching on the northern safari circuit, there's much more: ____ (2)____ (**HAUNT**) calls of water birds fill the air at serene Lake Eyasi; beautiful Mt Meru beckons with ____ (3)____ (**FORGET**) sunrise panoramas from its summit; the barren landscapes of the Crater Highlands offer rugged but satisfying hiking; and lively rural markets draw ____ (4)____ (**TRADE**) from miles around to haggle over everything from a head of cattle to a kilo of maize. Enjoy ____ (5)____ (**DELIGHT**) highland lodges amid the coffee plantations around Karatu, take in the Rift Valley vistas around Lake Manyara, experience the subtleties of the Tarangire ecosystem or ____ (6)____ (**SIMPLE**) take in all the contrasts, as world-class safari lodges jostle for space with mud-thatched houses, and red-cloaked Maasai ____ (7)____ (**WAR**) follow centuries-old traditions while office workers brush by in Western dress.

Mis-shapen fruit and veg laws set to be scrapped

Curvy cucumbers and nobbly carrots will be back on sale in the shops from next July if, as expected, more than **twenty-four (1)** laws banning imperfect-looking fruit and veg are scrapped today.

EU-wide marketing standards ensuring only the finest-looking produce reaches supermarket shelves have been in force for 20 years. But to reduce red tape and bureaucracy - and make cheaper fruit and veg available as household bills **increase (2)** - eurocrats say it is time the unnecessary restrictions disappear. EU standards currently stipulate the size and shape of 36 types of fruit and veg sold in Europe, from apricots to watermelons.

If today's vote goes through, the rules will be **abolished (3)** for 26 of them, including artichokes, asparagus, Brussels sprouts, cucumbers, onions, peas, carrots, plums, and ribbed celery.

Particular (4) market rules would stay in place for the 10 products which account for 75% of EU fruit and veg trade - apples, citrus fruit, kiwi fruit, lettuces, peaches/nectarines, pears, strawberries, sweet peppers, table grapes and tomatoes. But national authorities could **exclude (5)** even those 10 from the rules on shape and size, as long as they are put on sale labelled as "product intended for processing" or something similar.

The Commission said that, if the vote goes through, the changes cannot be **carried out (6)** until the start of July next year, for practical reasons. But when the mis-shapen produce does reach the shelves, retailers **calculate (7)** it could be sold as much as 40% cheaper than the **present (8)** "class one" goods.

Conservative MEP Neil Parish said: "These crazy rules have to go **instantly (9)**. "To stop stores selling perfectly decent food during a food crisis is morally unjustifiable. "**Recognition (10)** should be given to the EU agriculture commissioner for pushing through these proposals, and pointing out that this is a matter that should not be decided by the EU.



"**Purchasers (11)** care about the taste and quality of food, not how it looks."



A Commission spokesman said: "These rules were originally asked for by the fruit and veg industry, because when a **distributor (12)** orders crates of cucumbers, he needs to have some **conception (13)** of the quality of the produce. We then based our rules on international standards applied by a committee of the United Nations.

"However, times have changed, and we agreed during negotiations last year that we could **dispose of (14)** red tape in this area.

"Now household budgets are tighter and there is the problem of wasting food too, so it makes more sense than ever to **permit (15)** people to buy mis-shapen fruit and veg if they wish." He added: "Also, there's a proliferation of private standards being set by some supermarkets for the produce they sell, and if there are to be standards for most of these goods, it can be left to national authorities."

Should you google your date?

You're bored, you're sitting in front of a computer and you have a first date in the next few days. Should you google? It'll only take a minute. What harm can it do?

There are lots of reasons why you would. Leaving aside the force of raw curiosity, you might actually uncover something you urgently need to know. Like the woman in New York in 2004 who googled her date and found an FBI warrant for his arrest. He'd been on the run for a year after allegedly stealing around \$100,000. She didn't turn up for dinner that Friday; the Feds agreed to stand in.

On many levels, date googling ("doogling") has become socially acceptable, despite the fact that this information could once only have come from a private detective. Zara Percy, director of reassuringly offline dating agency The County Register and all-round romance expert, says: "I think the majority of people will do it if they know the person's surname. It's hard to resist, and it doesn't make you a bunny boiler." But, she adds: "It may put you in a difficult situation where you know something you shouldn't and then have to feign ignorance when it is mentioned."

The trouble is that the one situation where it's not comfortable to discuss your findings is on the date itself. If you've already discovered that he or she once won a Bafta, or spent three years learning throat-singing in Mongolia, you will find yourself steering conversation in that direction. Things become stilted; the spirit of mutual discovery isn't quite what it ought to be. Not only that, you run the risk of forgetting what you've been told and what you're not meant to know yet. You ask him how his pet bunny is and he peers at you oddly.

Whatever we decide, there is still a big chance that our date has googled us: a recent survey in the US put the "doogling" figure at 43% and it's hard to imagine it's less in the UK. This means googling ourselves is no longer the province of the merely vain, but a virtual mirror that we should perhaps start checking.

Unfortunately, it's often odd material that rises to the top of the web and threatens to define us: an online petition we signed long ago, an old essay for the student paper, a comment we left on a website then forgot about. Hardly anything to do with who we really are, then. It's not as if there is a one-stop shop with a comprehensive gallery of images and videos and a list of all our friends ...
